This is my last contribution to the Scope as the president of British Society for Gynaecological Endoscopy. I will be handing over the presidency to our President-Elect Dominic Byrne during our Annual Scientific Meeting in Cornwall.



After a very busy 2015 for the BSGE, 2016 started even busier. Firstly, we registered more new members and passed the 1000 member landmark in January of this year! This means that we have doubled the number of members in the last five years.

We selected the successful candidates for the Trainees' Advanced Laparoscopy Training Programmes generously sponsored by Ethicon and Olympus UK. We received 110 applications in total and were able to accept 36 of these trainees onto the two programmes. The successful trainees will complete four modules at different locations in the United Kingdom and Europe under the supervision of BSGE Faculty during the course of 2016. We hope to increase the number of places available next year, as the programmes proved to be very popular. This is yet another indication that interest in endoscopic surgery in the UK is high and that the BSGE initiatives are successfully responding to the demand.

We also launched the National Laparoscopic Hysterectomy Training Programme (LapHyst) for consultants this year. Applications will have closed for the first pilot programme by the time you read this issue of the Scope and the second pilot will have been announced. Training of the faculty is already underway with support from our colorectal surgeon colleagues who successfully ran the LapCo programme. After the initial pilots, we will roll out the programme with higher number of places.

You will have seen the activities around organisation of our Annual Scientific Meeting (ASM) in Cornwall. I am pleased that we have a dedicated website (www.bsge2016.org) for the ASM and you will be able to see the details of the programme for the pre-congress courses and the main programme, as well as registration and abstract submission details. The accepted abstracts will again be published in our official journal Gynaecological Surgery. We are running the popular Hands-on-Training Course this year again on the 16th May and there will be an Endometriosis Nurses Study Day during the main meeting.

Preparations are already under way for the Joint RCOG/BSGE ATSM Benign Abdominal Surgery: Open and Laparoscopic Theoretical Meeting. We will also have dedicated BSGE sessions in the main programme of the RCOG World Congress in June in Birmingham and RCOG Professional Development Conference in November. As some of you are aware, we are running a second practical course for the ATSM Hysteroscopic Surgery this summer due to high demand and will run the usual main theoretical course and its practical component later in November.

The Joint BSGE/RCOG Guideline on the Management of Endometrial Hyperplasia has just been released after a thorough analysis of the literature and I expect many of you will find it useful in your clinical practice. We are currently developing two more evidence based guidelines and these will be released in due course.

The video recording of the 2015 Silver Jubilee Meeting is now available to our members via our website. I hope you will be able to see and enjoy the presentations you missed or want to hear again.

We are currently developing a new website which will bring a contemporary look but will also be more functional. We will be happy to hear any suggestions you may have for our new website.

The BSGE Council will have an 'away day' before the ASM in Cornwall and we hope to discuss the progress of our current projects, as well as new developments in that meeting.

Elections for the BSGE Council are currently under way. I expect there will be many applications for the positions which will be available after the ASM and I encourage you to use your vote to ensure we elect the candidates which represent the choice of our membership.

Finally, I am sure you will agree with me that our society has grown rapidly and become highly influential both nationally and internationally. I am confident that the future leadership will maintain this momentum and bring the BSGE to new levels. I wish them much success and have no doubt that the future is bright for the BSGE and its membership.

With my best wishes to you all and hope to see many of you in Cornwall.

Laparoscopy Training

The Joint BSGE / RCOG Benign Abdominal Surgery ATSM course was held on the 21st and 22nd September 2015. This was a 2 day theoretical course. This year we added a trial of Hands on Workshop which was optional for the candidates. We had a very good response and most of the candidates were able to attend (70).



The feedback was very good and 82% of the candidates wanted to have a practical workshop included with a future course.

At the course there were several stations which included hands on training and experience with suturing and learning the different modalities of energy on tissue.

In view of this the organisers for the next course (Mr Saikat Banerjee, Mr Ertan Saridogan and Mr Sameer Umranikar) are working on a proposal to hold a 3 day course in September this year. The first 2 days will be theoretical and third day will be for hands on training. This will include demonstration and practice of suturing, undertaking the LASTT and SUTT programs from the European Academy, demonstration of different energy modalities and practical workshops on stack system, video editing and use of different laparoscopic instruments.

This will give an opportunity for candidates to undertake useful practical training following a 2 day theoretical course.

PORTFOLIO REPORTS

Endometriosis Centres

The annual accreditation report was completed in January and it was very pleasing that all accredited centres successfully completed the accreditation process for this year.



From the provisional centres in

2015, four centres were unsuccessful and have been removed from the database but 3 other provisional centres have started data collection for this year. In total we now have 50 accredited centres which has remained fairly static over the past 2 years and is the number projected to be required based on population modelling with each centre seeing approximately 50 cases per year. In addition to numbers, we have also published follow up completion for each centre so they can see how well they perform with this. The introduction of email follow up and automatic reminders on the database will hopefully improve performance in an area that has been open to criticism.

Exemplar videos are due to be submitted by the end of April to support accreditation for 2016 and next year we will introduce accreditation based on numbers per surgeon rather than numbers per unit.

We anticipate the publication of the first 2 scientific papers this year based on the data from the project and presentations at the ASM in May and RCOG world congress in June.

Individual centres are also beginning to analyse their own data which is encouraging and will give relevant information that can be shared with their patient groups. We also hope this will be seen in presentation form at relevant meetings to encourage discussion on the centres project.

We look forward to the forthcoming ASM in Cornwall where we have breakout sessions for endometriosis centres and for endometriosis nurse specialists.


17th May Endometriosis Nurses training day

Live laparoscopic surgery will be video streamed from two Integrated Laparoscopic Theatres at the Royal Cornwall Hospital to a dedicated lecture theatre onsite. A facilitator will guide the viewing audience between the two operating theatres' video streams to optimise opportunities and ensure a continuous programme. The audience can communicate with operating surgeons to ask questions and ensure full understanding of the procedures. In addition unedited video from the faculty of complex Laparoscopic procedures will be shown to supplement the live programme, maintain continuous viewing and broaden the range of procedures presented.

Procedures being planned include:

- Total Laparoscopic Hysterectomy Sub-Total Laparoscopic Hysterectomy with in bag morcellation
- Laparoscopic Sacrohysteropexy Retroperitoneal pelvic dissection and ureterolysis
- Laparoscopic excision of severe rectovaginal endometriosis including segmental bowel resection



Trainees

It has been a successful and active period so far for trainees

Collaboration with YEP

The ASM in London was very well attended at the trainees session and represented our first collaborative meeting in the U,K with the young Endoscopist Platform (YEP). We aim to strengthen this relationship giving trainees alike an opportunity to meet and discuss training within gynaecological endoscopy. It will also enable more oversees fellowships, and trips to observe experts in other European countries more easily accessible.



The BSGE continues to have presence

at the RCOG medical students' careers day, trying to encourage more students to join our speciality and subspecialty. The laparoscopic simulation sessions were well attended by students, and continue to create excitement and interest. As a result of this and to maintain enthusiasm, the BSGE now include FREE membership to medical students.

In addition to the medical students' day at the RCOG we represented the BSGE at the RCOG junior doctors' careers day which was last held on Saturday 21st November 2015, at the College. Again this was the most visited workshop and highlights the importance of encouraging junior doctors in to our speciality. RCOG 21/11/15 – BSGE session, Junior doctors careers day.

Sponsored Advanced Laparoscopy Courses for Trainees

The BSGE this year also are in the process of selecting 36 successful trainees who will attend the sponsored advanced laparoscopy courses spread over a few days, concentrating on laparoscopic hysterectomy and advanced energy devices (12 sponsored by Olympus and 24 by Ethicon). These courses are brilliant as a training opportunity and again continue to be highly subscribed.

Fresh Cadaveric Laparoscopic Anatomy Course

The next highly subsided course by the BSGE that will run in Oxford will be the workshop on Fresh Human Cadaveric Laparoscopic Anatomy and Advanced Gynaecological Laparoscopic Surgery (Sponsored by Striker and Covidien). This





is taking place in April 2016 and is a fantastic training and learning experience for trainees which will continue to be at least an annual course available through the BSGE.

This well-structured, oversubscribed two-day work shop is going ahead for the third time successfully. It has been really beneficial for many BSGE senior trainee and consultant members over the last two years. We have received positive feedback. The main objectives of this course would include, demonstrating operative/dissection techniques, laparoscopic dissections of pelvic anatomy and to provide hands on training sessions to improve technical performance in laparoscopic gynaecological surgery.



Registrars in Gynaecological Surgery group (RIGS)

One of the most exciting developments for trainees which will be launched at the ASM in Cornwall, will be the Registrars in Gynaecological Surgery (RIGS) group.

This will be a group run by trainees for trainees and will have an integral role within the BSGE. There will be a structured forum for trainees, the BSGE website will have a dedicated section for RIGS (which is currently in development), advice on how to pursue in a career in endoscopic surgery,

preparation tips for consultant posts, courses, videos, fellowship opportunities, meetings specifically for trainees, roles within the group for trainees to become actively involved as well as trainee specific meetings and social events.

As part of the training opportunities available we are also designing web based procedural skills modules for gynaecological trainees at all levels (ST1-ST7), highlighting our commitment and the importance we place on training.

It is therefore an exciting time for trainees within the society and we will continue to represent your needs at the council meetings, voicing your views and suggestions to improve training opportunities and address any concerns.

We would like to thank those of you who completed the advanced laparoscopic ATSM trainees survey, and look forward to meeting as many of you at the ASM in Cornwall!

Annual Nurse Hysteroscopy Meeting

Report from the Annual Nurse Hysteroscopy Meeting, Bradford University, 4th March 2016

The meeting this year was once again very well attended and despite being held slightly later this year was accompanied by snowfall. It opened with the inevitable, but devastating announcement of the imminent retirement of Professor Sian Jones. Space here does not allow for an adequate tribute to our founder and ambassador, except to express sincere gratitude for all of Sian's hard work and support over the last 16 years, we will miss her greatly and wish her all the very best for the future.



The main theme of the meeting was pain management, Julia Pansini-Murrell presented recent audits which demonstrated that despite the RCOG Guidelines (2010) there are still significant variations in protocols across the UK. The use of NSAIDs one hour before hysteroscopy should be recommended to all patients where there are no contraindications.

Alex Sutcliff's presentation on her focus group work on developing patient information leaflets revealed distressing patient's perspectives of pain during outpatient hysteroscopy. Furthermore, it has transpired that Internet campaign groups are highly critical of financially incentivised ambulatory procedures and are demanding more patient choice in terms of pain management. The workshop on patient leaflets demonstrated the challenges in standardising information where operational protocols remain heterogeneous. Nevertheless, the group have committed to collaborate on information leaflets to produce evidenced based guidelines that fully reflect patient's views and can be adopted at a local level.

Gill Smith provided a fascinating overview of her experience introducing non-medical sedation during hysteroscopic treatments, challenging traditional practice and communication. The ability to provide hypnosis as an alternative or complimentary technique for pain management has been established in other medical fields and certainly warrants further formal exploration in ambulatory gynaecology.



There have been significant increases in the numbers of qualified nurse hysteroscopists There are now 90 qualified nurse hysteroscopists with a further 26 in training. Twenty-seven nurse hysteroscopists are also undertaking a variety of treatments including polypectomy. Novasure, Mini-touch and Essure. An audit of mini touch ablation procedures and outcomes was presented by Gill Steele and resulted in a healthy debate on evidence-based evaluation of ablation outcomes. The advancement of nurse hysteroscopy practice reflects a natural evolution in service provision facilitating safe, cost effective and accessible care. However, the development of the nurse hysteroscopists in terms of challenging practice and providing critical analysis of the evidence certainly set the tone of the meeting.

The afternoon included industry workshops with opportunity for hands on simulator sessions on a variety of treatment methods that was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Concerns about appropriate accreditation for nurses undertaking operative and therapeutic procedures have now been resolved with nurses being able to achieve accreditation following attendance at RCOG, BSGE and industry training events, and submission of a completed logbook, signed off by the nominated trainer and audit questionnaire to Bradford University. There are also opportunities to attain level 7 university credits by enrolling on the independent study module for 10, 20 or 30 credits as required. A register of all accreditations will be held by the BSGE.


