Editor's Notes



Happy New year fellow BSGE members and welcome to the latest edition of the Scope. I trust you all had a rewarding festive period, as I did, and are looking forward to the rewards of 2019.

One of those rewards lies ahead in Wales, in our annual scientific meeting at the Celtic Manor. Not to let any 'cats out of the bag' I can guarantee that it will be a meeting to remember, from the location, the scientific point of view, and the social activities that the local organising committee has arranged. More details can be found on the website, on the Facebook page and in this Scope.

There is currently a lot going on in the world of minimal access surgery, Rebecca Mallick as usual has done an excellent job in selecting noteworthy and topical articles from literature. It is particularly important to highlight articles that have benefitted from BSGE funding and support. These include Kruppa Madhvani et al's paper in the BJOG: "Route of hysterectomy: a retrospective, cohort study in English NHS Hospitals from 2011-201. The article highlights the increase in minimal access hysterectomy in the UK and dovetails nicely with the recent RCOG publication: "RCOG report on Patterns of benign gynaecology care in English NHS hospital trusts 2015/2016". Both of these papers can be used to bench mark our performance and be used as evidence to improve minimal access surgery in our individual units.

Another article to remember from Rebecca's last series in The Scope is our very own "Laparoscopic excision of deep rectovaginal endometriosis in BSGE endometriosis centres: a multicentre prospective cohort study" published last year in BMJ open. A very good example of collaboration and prospective gathering of information to improve outcomes for women with endometriosis.

An important way to influence practice is to participate in the development of scientific impact papers. The RCOG Scientific Advisory Committee (SAC) meets three times a year to oversee the development of scientific impact papers. The committee is keen to ensure that future SIPs address pertinent topics across the specialist areas of practice within O&G, and would welcome suggestions from all of the specialist societies. One of the question in this year's BSGE membership survey invites suggestions for topics you would like included.

Talking of social media, the BSGE is looking to develop a bigger presence on Facebook and Twitter and hope that you will all visit our pages and make them as interactive as possible.

BSGE council members and officers are always looking for ways to improve the Society and your suggestions are invaluable. From our presence on Twitter we have had overwhelming support for the recently published hysteroscopy guidelines in collaboration with the RCOG. There have also been robust discussions around the issue of power morcellation following on from the invitation for feedback from the joint RCOG/BSGE information leaflet on power morcellation of fibroids.

In the media there have been interesting documentaries like "The Bleeding Edge" on Netflix, looking into women's health issues such as Essure and robotic hysterectomy. It is worth a watch, as it gives insight into the interactions between industry, healthcare and members of the public BSGE membership is now open to those living outside the UK with many inviting benefits. Our last membership survey was in 2017, the response rate was encouraging and we have been able to improve a few things, thanks to your responses.

This year I am sending round a membership survey and hoping for a high response rate. The survey acts as an informative way for the Society to solicit the views of you, our members. The last survey showed that the majority of members support the activities of the BSGE, we anticipate that this year we will be able to measure any trends in the response to activities laid on by the BSGE.

In this edition of the Scope, there is an interesting article by Nadine Donato. It highlights her very rewarding visit to Professor Horace Roman in Bordeaux. I hope everyone enjoys the read. I also hope to hear from members who visit other units, either within or outside the UK, so we can feature their experiences in the Scope, to encourage the sharing of learning within the membership. 

President's Message

I'd like to wish all BSGE members a happy new year, I hope it will be a successful one for you personally, and for the Society as a whole.

I would like to open my message by welcoming some new faces: Bindle Desai joins Atia as Deputy Specialist Society Co-ordinator and we also have two new council members, Tom Smith-Walker and Funlayo Odejinmi (Jimi) who are quickly becoming established in their portfolios.

There will be further council changes this year. Look out for an e-mail inviting nominations next month. I encourage you all to vote, the BSGE is your Society and by exercising your democratic right you can influence its future direction. Atia will also be contacting members with details of all subcommittee vacancies, I'd like to invite you all to consider joining, so that we can further widen member participation.

Krupa Madhvani has recently had a paper published in the BJOG. The BSGE-funded landmark study looks at the current UK status of laparoscopic hysterectomy. It shows a steady increase in laparoscopic hysterectomy rates over six years and demonstrates that our educational and training processes are paying dividends and improving patient care.

BSGE has continued to have a very busy schedule. There was a very successful HMB meeting at RCOG in December, which is reported on later in this issue of The Scope. Award assessment and allocation now happens with increased frequency and the budget has been increased. Last year we announced that a new category of overseas member was in development, I am pleased to report that applications for international members go live next week. We completed the BSGE / Olympus and BSGE / Ethicon programmes in 2018, with 48 training places offered in advanced laparoscopic surgery techniques, we look forward to announcing the successful applicants for 2019 very soon. We also look forward to the next workshop on cadaveric anatomy and surgery workshop in Warwick in partnership with Stryker. I am very grateful to all our industry partners for their vital ongoing support in training

Towards the end of last year the Society released a statement on hysteroscopy, the full wording of which is available in the news section of The Scope and on the website. It is important to give women choice about whether hysteroscopy is performed in an ambulatory setting or under general anaesthetic as a day case, as part of a fully informed consent process. Together with the RCOG, we have produced and published an excellent patient information leaflet on hysteroscopy, which is also available on the website. I would recommend that all members read both documents.

You will see in the news section that a membership survey will be coming soon, please respond so that we can better understand member needs. It's your Society and by sharing your opinion, your experience and your knowledge, in elections, subcommittees, the Scope and in the survey you can help shape its future.

As the new year starts we look forward to ASM 2019 at Celtic Manor. The conference is set to be one of the best yet. The location is beautiful and the LOC have put together an outstanding programme academically and socially, with Adam Kay as the speaker at the annual gala dinner. It is essential to register and book accommodation as soon as possible. Look closely at the early bird rates, which end on February 18th. I look forward to seeing you all in Wales.

As we go to press, this year is set to be a time of change politically. As a Society we will continue to be inclusive, welcoming and to work closely with colleagues across the globe to share knowledge and skills, enhance training and improve the health of women. BSGE Ambulatory Gynaecology Network

The inaugural meeting of the Ambulatory Care Network will take place in Birmingham from 28-29th March 2019.

Many diagnostic and therapeutic interventions can now be undertaken in an outpatient setting, within selfcontained hospital or community facilities. Diagnostic and operative endoscopy, diagnostic and therapeutic imaging and many general gynaecological interventions can be carried out without general anaesthesia. This makes ambulatory care attractive to patients, health care professionals and managers.

Ambulatory gynaecological care is generally safe, convenient, cost-effective and associated with rapid recovery time. However, managing women who are awake in an outpatient setting presents a number of challenges.

The first Ambulatory Care Network meeting will explore all issues related to gynaecological ambulatory care, including protocols and pathways, referral criteria and preparation and pain-relief techniques to optimise the patient experience. The group will share practice and explore, from experience, what works and what doesn't.

Most of the time in each session will be allocated to discussion, through Q&A, small group breakouts and written questions that may be submitted via e-mail or social media. Subjects to address include overcoming hurdles, the research and evidence base, quality assurance and issues around funding and dealing with commissioners.

BSGE Vice President Justin Clark is heading up the group which includes gynaecologists, GPs and nurses. He told The Scope:

"Advances in technology combined with the enthusiasm of clinicians and the demands of our patients has resulted in much contemporary gynaecological practice being delivered in an ambulatory setting. This new interactive forum provides an exciting opportunity for doctors and nurses with a passion for ambulatory care to learn from each other, share ideas, improve quality, direct research and innovate within this expanding field."





BSGE Statement on Hysteroscopy

The BSGE has made a statement about outpatient hysteroscopy in response to demand from members and patients. The statement is printed in full below, it is also available on the website together with high-quality information leaflets that can be downloaded by members and given to patients:

Diagnostic hysteroscopy is a commonly performed investigation; it is safe and of short duration. Most women are able to have the procedure in an outpatient setting, with or without local anaesthesia, and find it convenient and acceptable. However, it is important that women are offered, from the outset, the choice of having the procedure performed as a day case procedure under general or regional anaesthetic. Some centres are also able to offer a conscious sedation service in a safe and monitored environment.

It is important that the procedure is stopped if a woman finds the outpatient experience too painful for it to be continued. This may be at the request of the patient or nursing staff in attendance, or at the discretion of the clinician performing the investigation.

Outpatient hysteroscopy has proved controversial, with a number of patient groups taking to Twitter to express their concerns. The BSGE statement, quoted in the new Green Top Guideline, has been widely welcomed. Hysteroscopy Action tweeted:

@RCObsGyn publishes important message from @TheBSGE - hospitals must allow women choice of OP, GA, epidural or safely monitored sedation for #hysteroscopy. Respect Montgomery informed consent.

Membership Survey

The BSGE has just launched the second member survey, which is being distributed as an online 'Survey Monkey' by email to all members. It has been developed by Funlayo Odejinmi (Jimi) in his role as member relations portfolio chair. Through the responses, the Society hopes to gain a greater understanding of opinion and satisfaction and to get an insight into the things that members value in the BSGE.

In 2017 the BSGE carried out the first survey of members. Overall the survey results were extremely positive. The Society aimed to build on the strengths and to improve performance and perception in the less successful areas.

The members who answered felt that the guidelines, the awards and bursaries and the education and networking opportunities that meetings like the ASM offer were among the most important parts of the BSGE's role. There was also wide support for continued access to the Journal of Gynaecological Surgery, ongoing association with ESGE and the AAGL, as well as interest in developing international membership opportunities.

The Society responded to the feedback, introducing portfolio sub-committees so that more members have a hand in the running of the BSGE. The RIGS group have regional representatives from across the UK, to ensure that trainees from north, south, east and west have a point of contact. President Sanjay Vyas said:

We have increased transparency in the appointment of positions, with clear job descriptions, standard operating procedures and an election scoring system. Anyone who has issues and concerns should contact a member of the council, we will listen and take action whenever necessary."


Dominic Byrne emphasised that the survey feedback has helped to shape BSGE policy:

'In direct response to member demand we have negotiated ongoing membership of the ESGE and open online access to The Journal. We are also currently developing overseas membership, which will be discussed at the AGM prior to being ratified and implemented.'

The 2019 survey is based on the previous survey, however it has been streamlined so that it is easier to complete. Extra questions have also been added, in response to requests by the chairs of some of the subcommittees.

Launching the survey, Jimi said:

The BSGE exists for the benefit of members. It is only by encouraging open feedback and debate that we can respond to concerns and plan for a strong future for the Society. I would encourage all members to fill in the survey, so that they can have an impact on the BSGE's future direction.'

BSGE open to Overseas Members

At the Annual General Meeting, 2018, a new BSGE category of overseas member was agreed.

Secretary Shaheen Khazali and Council have been working to introduce this new development and the Society has announced that international membership is now available.

It is anticipated that this will increase BSGE membership, facilitate shared learning and increase co-operation with international colleagues.

6. Training 7. Quality assurance 8. Research




Angharad Jones reports for The Scope from the AAGL conference in America



Call for Abstracts

Abstract submission for BSGE ASM 2019 is open. Abstracts are invited for inclusion in the programme as either oral presentation, electronic poster or video presentation or video poster. The ASM is now paperless, so all applications should be submitted via the online form before the deadline of March 1st at 5pm.

The BSGE hands out well over a thousand pounds in prizes at the ASM. The awards for video, oral, poster and video poster presentations are hotly contested. As well as the financial reward, the prizes are highly prestigious and the winners will be featured in The Scope and on the BSGE website.

The winner of the 'Best Video' presentation will be awarded the Golden Telescope and will also earn the Karl Storz supported BSGE bursary to a course of their choosing, within Europe, at any Karl Storz supported centre.

The LOC emphasised that submitting an abstract does not automatically register you as an ASM delegate. If an abstract is accepted for presentation, at least one author must pay the registration fee to attend the ASM for both days. The presenting author must register for the meeting by the Early Bird deadline of 12th April 2019.

The Website and Digital Governance Portfolio have worked hard to develop an app in time for Celtic Manor. Portfolio Chair Fevzi Shakir told The Scope:


"We are currently building the app together with the Society's website hosting company. Following last year's move to online registration, we are aiming for the ASM 2019 to be totally paperless."

Pre-congress Courses

They have been organised by the BSGE in conjunction with the Local Organising Committee and cover a variety of subjects of interest to people working within our speciality.

Consultant Interview Preparation Course >>



This one day interview course contains a variety of interactive sessions and coaching on relevant current topics within the NHS to help you prepare for consultant interviews. This course will include small group discussions, practice questions and mock interviews with individual feedback.

Outpatient Diagnostic and Operative Hysteroscopy >>



A one-day workshop that aims to provide both theoretical knowledge and practical training to develop your outpatient operative hysteroscopy skills. It will include tips and tricks on how to set up an outpatient hysteroscopy suite, the equipment required and provide hands on training on both diagnostic and operative hysteroscopic procedures.

Intermediate Gynaecological Ultrasound >>



This is a practical simulation based ultrasound course focusing specifically on gynaecological ultrasound, in particular transvaginal scanning. The aim of the course is to cover key aspects of the RCOG curriculum module 'Intermediate ultrasound in gynaecology'. There will be an opportunity to have hands on the simulators and learn about the machine settings to optimize the image.

BSGE / RIGS Intermediate Laparoscopic Course >>



This intensive practical simulation course is arranged jointly by BSGE-RIGS. The aim of the course is to cover key operative laparoscopic requirements within the RCOG curriculum. In addition, the day will include a re-cap of relevant anatomy, electrosurgery techniques and the chance to practice and develop skills in laparoscopic suturing. The course is aimed at ST3 trainees and above or others with the equivalent surgical experience.

BSGE GESEA Exams >>



The BSGE in collaboration with the ESGE runs the Gynaecological Endoscopy Education and Assessment (GESEA) Programme in the UK. This is a structured training programme set up by the ESGE and the European Academy of Gynaecological Surgery.

Candidates who wish to enrol for GESEA certification are required to complete the e-learning module provided by the Winners Project. This is free to access via the websurg website: www. websurg.com/winners/ All e learning modules must be completed before the examination to qualify to sit the examination.

Where appropriate, transfers will be arranged to the course venue. All courses run concurrently, so delegates should choose only one. Spaces are limited, pre-registration and payment is required in order to secure your place.

BSGE Cycle Ride Team 2018

Bordeaux Report

Nadine di Donato reports for The Scope on a memorable trip to Bordeaux to learn from Professor Horace Roman and his team.

Denis Tsepov, a colleague and fellow consultant in gynaecological minimally invasive surgery had the exciting idea of visiting Professor Horace Roman in Bordeaux. We hoped to gain an overview of different surgical techniques, theatre settings and theatre staff in France. The trip also aimed to strengthen international relationships between different specialities within the endometriosis team and learn from our European colleagues.



The team from the UK comprised five people in total: Mr. Denis Tsepov, consultant gynaecological laparoscopic surgeon, Mr. Valerio Celentano consultant colorectal surgeon and myself Nadine Di Donato, consultant gynaecological laparoscopic surgeon all from the Endometriosis Centre in Queen Alexandra Hospital, Portsmouth. We were joined by Mr Chris Chan, consultant colorectal surgeon and Viorica Burea, Endometriosis CNS from the Endometriosis Centre at the Harley Street Clinic, London.




We were all incredibly excited to meet the professor and to have the opportunity to observe eight surgical cases treating women with severe endometriosis. The actual surgery in the morning started at eight am and the time between cases was only twenty minutes! Professor Roman performed four bowel resections in a single day. We had the opportunity to observe the use of PlasmaJet in rectal shaving and in the treatment of ovarian endometriosis. It was an endometriosis marathon!





In Bordeaux we also had plenty of fun and delicious French food. We enjoyed an amazing dinner with oysters, entrecote and wine. The city is renowned for its wines, considered amongst the best in the world. The cultural, artistic, and music scenes are very vibrant and there are many cafés, gardens, and museums in which to taste the atmosphere of the city. The whole experience was both interesting and inspiring.



BSGE Meeting on Contemporary Management of Heavy Menstrual Bleeding

Heavy menstrual bleeding is one of the most common symptoms requiring investigation and treatment in both primary and secondary care. One in five women suffer with heavy periods and menstrual problems make up 12% of all referrals to gynaecology services,. The numbers are high but NICE believes that many more women should have further investigation.

On December 7th, the BSGE presented an all-day meeting on the contemporary management of this problem. The conference took place at the College and reflected best practice and the implications of the new NICE guidelines on HMB.

The first NICE Heavy Menstrual Bleeding Guideline was first produced in 2007 (NG44). This year it was substantially revised, in-line with recent innovations and the body of research evidence (NG 88). BSGE members were involved in reviewing the updated guideline, which was first published in February, 2018 and further reviewed in November, 2018. Some of the new recommendations are considered controversial and the guideline will have a significant impact on clinical practice in both primary and secondary care.

One of the course organisers, BSGE Vice President Justin Clark said:

"Heavy menstrual bleeding is a common problem, so the course was designed to meet the needs of professionals treating patients in hospital and the community. This was a challenge, but the meeting will provide a very important platform to discuss the controversies following the release of the new NICE guidelines."

The HMB clinical guideline recommends that women should be offered outpatient hysteroscopy if they have HMB together with symptoms or risk factors for gynaecological conditions including submucosal fibroids, polyps or endometrial pathology, including persistent intermenstrual bleeding. NICE estimates this will lead to around 10,000 more women undergoing outpatient hysteroscopy. NICE guidelines director Professor Mark Baker said:

"Since we published our original guideline in 2007 there have been significant advances in diagnostic techniques, which have been reflected in the new guideline. In many circumstances ultrasound has been replaced with hysteroscopy as a first-line investigative test as it provides a more accurate diagnosis."

The BSGE meeting featured an excellent faculty, including international experts, gynaecological surgeons who contributed to the guideline, people who have criticised the recommendations and others who have provided major contributions to the scientific literature in heavy menstrual bleeding. The four sessions were chaired by Hilary Critchley, Jonathan Lord, Justin Clark and Ertan Saridogan.

Laparoscopic hysterectomy has always been a hot topic for BSGE members and the general gynaecology community. Prior to the meeting Shaheen Khazali took to the BSGE Facebook group to comment, via his personal account, on the updated NICE Guidelines:

"Hot off the press: NICE published an update on the heavy menstrual bleeding guidelines. Significant change of position on route of hysterectomy recommendation but still couldn't bring themselves to say it! Left column is the old recommendation; middle column is the new recommendation and the right column is the reason for change. Come on NICE, you can do better than that."

Taking into account the need for individual assessment, the route of hysterectomy should be considered in the following order: first line vaginal; second line abdominal. (1.8.6)

When discussing the route of hysterectomy (laparoscopy, laparotomy or vaginal) with the woman, carry out an individual assessment and take her preferences into account. [2007, amended 2018] (1.5.18)

The comparison between different routes of hysterectomy was out of the scope of the protocol. The committee agreed the old recommendation is no longer valid, because the laparoscopic route is usually preferable. However, they agreed to place the emphasis




"NICE intended to provide a seamless guideline for the management of heavy menstrual bleeding from primary to secondary care. The focus was on the total management rather than the question of laparoscopic hysterectomy or conventional methods of hysterectomy.' He added 'there is now an NIHR research call which can provide significant funding for a trial to further compare and evaluate TLH compared to abdominal or vaginal hysterectomy- EVALUATE trial mark 2!.'

The course covered the pathogenesis and investigation of HMB as well as its treatment and the impact on women affected. It covered the medical management, the treatment of people with haematological abnormalities and novel radiological interventions.

Of course, as a BSGE meeting, there was also plenty of debate and advice about surgical management. Renowned Dutch surgeon Frank Willem Jansen presented a talk entitled Hysterectomy for HMB: Indications and Outcomes. He told The Scope:

"The most important thing is to manage the quality of surgery. In the past that was difficult, but with the new QUSUM application, we have the mechanism to monitor the quality of hysterectomy surgery."

In the afternoon session Ray Garry asked the guestion 'Which hysterectomy for HMB?' and Jonathan Lord spoke about endometrial ablation. The meeting was well received by delegates from primary and secondary care, helping to explain the rationale for the new guideline and putting the recommendations for the management of heavy menstrual bleeding into context.

Portfolio Reports

Endometriosis Centres

The Endometriosis Centres project continues to grow and gain respect. In 2018, the BSGE Endometriosis Centres Scientific Advisory Group published



ground-breaking research in BMJ Open. Laparoscopic excision of deep rectovaginal endometriosis in BSGE endometriosis centres: a multicentre prospective cohort study, was the largest study of its kind in the world. Using data from the Endometriosis Centres, the study looked at nearly 5000 patients who had surgery for severe endometriosis, performed by more than 100 different surgeons in 51 different hospitals. Emma Cox, Chief Executive of Endometriosis UK welcomed the research

'Clearly shows the necessity and positive effects of laparoscopic excisional surgery for women with rectovaginal endometriosis. This is proof that - done by experts in specialist centres – surgery can reduce pain and severe symptoms, enabling women to stay in work as well as improving their quality of life.'

NICE published a guideline on endometriosis in 2017. BSGE Endometriosis Centres were recognised within this. They are seen as an opportunity to deliver a specialist service nationally which should prove to be beneficial to patients and more cost effective.

Future challenges

In the future, one of the challenges will be to decide how far or how wide the scope of the Endometriosis Centres should be. There has been a great deal of international interest in developing centres. We need to understand how broad we can make the project and continue to ensure that centres are appropriately accredited.

Following successful publication, we look forward to continuing to use the database as a source of information and research output. However, data protection is a further challenge for the portfolio, accordingly we have made a decision to make all patient data anonymous.

Exemplar Videos

Exemplar videos were introduced in 2016 and have now been embedded in accreditation. The accreditation process is evolving and a minimum of 10 hours per week became mandatory for centre accreditation in 2018. Exemplar videos had to be completed by the end of December are being assessed in January 2019.



supported on the subcommittee by Karolina Afors and Ilyas Nikopolous who have already made huge contributions to laparoscopic training.

The BSGE has provided exceptional opportunities for training in advanced laparoscopy over the years, especially with the development of the Ethicon and Olympus ST5+ courses. Within my role as laparoscopic training chair, I aim to try and help improve the delivery of laparoscopic training courses at deanery level so that quality of teaching, equipment and models are standardized.

Myself and James McLaren, under the trainees portfolio, introduced an intermediate laparoscopy course. This is aimed at ST3-5 trainees to help develop their skills in ovarian cystectomy, salpingectomy and oophorectomy as well as an introduction to laparoscopic suturing. This course ran twice last year and a similar course will form one of the pre-congress workshops at the BSGE Celtic Manor Meeting in May 2019.

I hope to be involved in the delivery of more Intermediate Laparoscopy Courses, which we hope can be facilitated by some of the RIGs regional representatives across the country, in the future.

The RCOG/ BSGE meeting in Benign Abdominal Surgery is an annual course which took place in September 2018. There were 65 delegates, most of which are undertaking the Benign Abdominal Surgery ATSM. RIGS / BSGE Intermediate Laparoscopy Course

Twenty delegates attended the course chaired by Donna Ghosh at Worcester Royal Hospital on October 18th-19th. The course was again well received with positive feedback. There is a plan to run the RIGS intermediate skills course programme condensed into one day as a pre-congress workshop at the ASM. This would continue the momentum of running the course and encourage juniors to attend the ASM.

Laparoscopic Training Mapping

Jessica Preshaw, the South West RIGS rep, has worked hard to produce an interactive map of each hospital in the UK detailing regional and local laparoscopic training opportunities including simulation equipment, laparoscopic trainers and courses, along with useful contacts within the region. This aims to support trainees make decisions regarding placement rotations and should aid decision making when applying for posts. We hope it will encourage trainees to access laparoscopic training opportunities and help drive improvements in facility provision.

A report has been submitted to RCOG assessing perception of gynaecological training amongst UK trainees according to region and training grade. Information was derived from TEF responses. The report concluded only half of all ST3-5 and just over half of ST6-7 trainees perceived they had adequate opportunity to fulfil their training requirements in gynaecology. There is poor access to box trainers or virtual reality simulators across most regions and all levels of training, with low provision of formal simulation training. RIGS and the Society will continue to work to improve access to and quality of training.



RIGS handbook

A RIGS handbook is now available. There is now written feedback from trainees at Whipps Cross Hospital who have used the RIGS handbook as a resource to develop a training programme. There will be further details about this in the next issue of The Scope.

A useful RCT assessing the benefits of laparoscopic guided tap block versus local anaesthetic infiltation for post-operative pain. Both appear to be as effective in reducing post operative pain in major gynaecological surgery

Retrospective cohort study comparing complications between laparoscopic myomectomy and TLH in women over the age of 40. Reassuringly laparoscopic myomectomy was not associated with any increased risk.
